Re: Park hours

I've begun the process of gathering information to formulate a recommendation on hours for operation of parks within the Town of Munster. While I'm not prepared to make a recommendation yet, I've found some information that I think you may find helpful as we prepare a recommendation to help defend a decision once it is made.

For comparison, I surveyed 14 communities in Lake County and the majority operate their parks from dawn to dusk.

Cedar Lake 5am-8pm
Crown Point 6am-10pm
Dyer dawn to dusk

Griffith parks with shelters are open until 10pm, others are dawn to dusk

Hammond dawn to dusk
Highland 5am-10:30pm
Hobart dawn to dusk
Lake County 7am-sunset
Lake Station dawn to dusk
Lowell dawn to dusk
Merrillville dawn to dusk

Munster dawn to dusk (bike trails 6am-8pm Nov. 1-Mar.31; 5:30am-10:30pm April 1-Oct. 31)

Schererville dawn to dusk

St. John currently 6am-11pm but in the process of changing to dawn to dusk

Whiting 7am – 6:30pm (used to be open to 10pm)

Additionally, our neighbors in Illinois, Village of Lynwood and Lan-Oak Park District (Lansing) open their parks from dawn to dusk.

I also compared to parks that were similar 'destination parks' on par with Centennial Park in Munster.

Wicker Park, Highland dawn to dusk (after hours events require security)

Lakefront Park, Whiting 7am-6:30pm (used to be open to 10pm)

Central Park Plaza, Valpo dawn-10pm

Bulldog Park, Crown Point 6am-10pm
Millennium Park, Chicago 8am-9pm
Maggie Daley Park, Chicago 6am-9pm
Promenade Park, Fort Wayne 6am-11pm

Riverwalk, Naperville Sunrise-midnight, (west section closes at 10pm)

Central Park, Mishawaka 7am-10pm

It's important to take into account the development of Centennial Park was always planned to be a 'destination park' that acted as an economic tool for the entire Town and more specifically, neighboring development like Centennial Village. The park and neighboring development was planned to be intermingled where a visitor might not recognize where the park ends and commercial/retail/residential property begins. This blended development concept was support for the ultimate Centennial Village/Centennial Park as we're seeing coming to fruition for the Town. Collectively, this area acts as a highly desired destination where people want to live, eat and play.

At this point we are still formulating a recommendation but will bring that forth to you after additional research, review and discussion with Town staff.
