Greetings! As I write this, we have all just finished digging out from the big snow we received after Valentine's Day, and the temperature is a downright balmy 23 degrees Fahrenheit. As we set our hopeful eyes towards spring and begin to hope for a thaw, I am also thinking of new starts, shoots of green, and

opportunities for improvement.

One of those opportunities is about trash and recycling. I am anticipating a new solid waste contract in 2021 that will reflect the soft demand for recyclables worldwide. One way that we can contain costs for solid waste is to reduce the volume of waste our community generates over time.

To that end, below are three suggestion to consider that would incrementally reduce the amount of municipal solid waste that is generated in our community.

Suggestion 1 - Try to limit the purchase of plastic beverage bottles. Reusable cups and water bottles are everywhere mitigating the need to buy a single-use plastic bottle. Even though we all recycle, the challenge is the demand created by the initial purchase. Further, demand for recycled materials has dropped, lowering the incentive for many waste haulers to offer competitive pricing for recycling services.

Suggestion 2 - Similar to the first suggestion, is to begin to examine how much plastic is being purchased. Is there a reusable alternative? There are often economical options for items like detergents and shampoos that are environmentally friendly and minimize waste.

Suggestion 3 – Consider composting your household food waste. Approximately 22% of all municipal solid waste is from food scraps. Much of that could be composted and thus diverted from the landfill. Composting enriches soil, helping retain moisture and suppress plant diseases and pests. It also reduces the need for chemical fertilizers and encourages the production of beneficial bacteria and fungi that break down organic matter.

If we can incorporate small incremental changes over time the results could be considerable to our pocketbook and community.

WELCOME TO

To register for kindergarten a child must be five years old on or before August 1, 2021. To register for first grade a child must be six years old on or before August 1, 2021.

At the time of the scheduled enrollment appointment, parents must provide:

- Certified/original birth certificate of the child. (Baptismal and hospital records are not acceptable as proof of birth)
- A valid driver's license with current Munster address.
- Residency verification documents (a complete list can be found on the Registration Gateway site.)

Please note: You must have legal residence in Munster to apply for enrollment. Only a parent or legal guardian may enroll a student.

TELEPHONE SCAM PREVENTION TIPS FROM THE MUNSTER POLICE DEPARTMENT

Residents are encouraged to read through the following types of phone scams which are reported to our department throughout the year.

- **GRANDPARENT SCAM** Residents, usually senior citizens, will receive a phone call from a suspect pretending to be a grandson, granddaughter, or other relative who is claiming to have been arrested or in a bad car accident. The suspect will ask the resident to either wire money directly to them or to purchase gift cards and call back with the redemption codes. If the resident asks too many questions, the suspect will sometimes hand the phone to a "police officer" who will tell the resident that the money needs to be sent immediately. Always hang up and call your relative directly (on their actual phone number) to check on them.
- **FBI/IRS SCAM** The suspect will call you pretending to be from the IRS or FBI while claiming that you either have an active warrant or owe back taxes. The suspect will then ask you to either wire money directly or purchase gift cards and call back with the redemption codes to satisfy the "tax debt" or "warrant." These suspects will often threaten the victim with arrest and even claim that they are on the way to your house if you are not cooperating. Always hang up immediately and call the police if you are concerned for your safety.
- INTERNET/COMPUTER SCAM The suspect will call you while claiming to be from a computer company, or may also pose as a police officer while claiming that your computer or IP address was hacked and that you are in danger of having your identity stolen. The suspect will sometimes ask you to go to your computer to provide them with remote access (never do this!), ask for bank account information, or will advise you to purchase gift cards and call back with the redemption codes to fix the matter.
- LOTTERY SCAM The suspect will call you advising that you won the lottery while advising that you have to send money to cover the taxes either through wiring it or by purchasing gift cards and calling back with the redemption codes. They will say that if you hang up you will lose your "winnings."
- **BANK SCAM** The suspect will call while pretending to be from your bank and will advise that your account was hacked. The suspect will ask for your bank account or Social Security information to "verify" who you are.
- CHARITY SCAM The suspect will call while advising that they are from a local charity (sometimes from the police department) and that they are collecting money for their cause. You should only provide donations to organizations that you know and trust, and which you can send donations to directly at an address that has been verified.

<u>NEVER</u> provide personal or bank account information over the phone to people you do not know and <u>NEVER</u> purchase gift cards for the purchase of reading redemption codes over the phone. Please call the Munster Police Department (911) if you ever are concerned that your identity has been stolen or if you need to speak with an officer with any questions.

PUBLIC WORKS

Alley Garbage and Recycling Collection

Public Works strives to keep alleys clear after a snowfall. In the event there is a large snowfall of 5" or greater, the snow that is pushed from the alley can accumulate on either side. The garbage and recycling toters can become immobile once buried in the snow. Waste Management (WM) is unable to retrieve the container using their automated arm if the snow becomes too high or iced over. Public Works requests residents to shovel around their toters when there is an accumulation of snow to insure access for WM.

Parkway & Mailbox Damage

Occasionally during snowplow season parkways and mailboxes can be damaged. If your parkway grass is damaged during a snow event from a snowplow contact Public Works at 836-6971 to report the damage. In the spring, the damaged area will be reseeded to restore the parkway. If your mailbox is damaged by a snowplow during a snow event call Public Works to report. If the mailbox is unusable a temporary mailbox will be installed and, in the spring, a permanent mailbox will be installed.

Electronic Recycling

Waste Management does not pick-up electronics or televisions. Electronics such as personal computers, laptops, printers, cell phones, DVD players and televisions can be brought to the electronic recycling shed located at 508 Fisher Street. The recycling shed is located outside of the gates at the Public Works facility, so it is always open. Your electronic items can be dropped off at any time because there is not an attendant. Electronic Recycling is available for Lake County residents only and not for non-profits, businesses or schools use.
